## RESIDENTIAL TREATMENT FACILITIES FOR CHILDREN AND ADOLESCENTS

Residential Treatment Facilities (RTF's) are residential facilities designed to support the treatment needs of children and adolescents who have a primary mental health diagnosis. Prior to a child being referred for a residential placement, all other community based treatment options are considered for the child and family, which are less restrictive.

There are two (2) types of residential facilities, accredited and non-accredited. An accredited Residential Treatment Facility is a residential program where the rate is an all inclusive treatment rate, which means the Office of Medical Assistance covers the entire rate. In a non-accredited Residential Treatment Facility, a room and board fee is charged which is separate from the treatment cost which is paid for by another third party (i.e., Children & Youth, Juvenile Probation, family, etc.).

It is important to note that children and adolescents who are adjudicated dependent or delinquent are not excluded from receiving services in most Residential Treatment Facilities. However, there are some Residential Treatment Facilities that will not accept children who are adjudicated delinquent. In fact, fifty-one (51), or 42.5% of children and adolescents within the Lackawanna-Susquehanna County Mental Health/Mental Retardation Program served in Residential Treatment Facilities in fiscal year 2007-2008, were adjudicated dependent or delinquent.

In fiscal year 1998-1999, the Lackawanna-Susquehanna County Mental Health/Mental Retardation Program Administrator's Office implemented a "Monthly Notification Form on Children/Youth in Residential Treatment Facilities." This form was designed for completion by the two (2) Base Service Units (BSUs), Scranton Counseling Center and Tri-County Human Services Center, Inc., to effectively track the

number of children and adolescents placed in EPSDT-funded residential treatment facilities (RTF's). The first EPSDT (Early and Periodic Screening, Diagnosis and Treatment)-funded placement in the Joinder Program area occurred in 1993, and the number of such placements has continued to grow over the years.

In this fiscal year, 2007-2008, fifty-two (52) of the one hundred twenty (120) children and adolescents served in Residential Treatment Facilities had admission dates prior to the start of the fiscal year, the earliest dating back to November, 2004.

TOTAL ADMISSIONS TO RESIDENTIAL TREATMENT FACILITIES  
BY GENDER/BSU – TABLE I

During the year, there were one hundred twenty (120) children and adolescents served in Residential Treatment Facilities. In 2006-2007, the Program served one hundred twenty-two (122) children and adolescents in Residential Treatment Facilities. Therefore, the Program experienced a decrease of two (2) or 1.6% children and adolescents served in Residential Treatment Facilities. With the exception of two years ago in which there was a decrease that was mostly an effect of the dissolution of Wayne County from the Lackawanna-Susquehanna County Joinder Program, the current decrease reflects a variation from the historical trends for Residential Treatment Facility Admissions. Base Service Unit I accounted for seventy-three (73) or 60.8% of those served, while forty-seven (47) or 39.2% were from Base Service Unit II. There were ninety-one (91) males, or 75.8%, and twenty-nine (29) females, or 24.2%.

TOTAL SERVED IN RESIDENTIAL TREATMENT FACILITIES  
BY GENDER/COUNTY – TABLE II

There were one hundred four (104) or 86.7% children and adolescents from Lackawanna County (77 males; 27 females) served in Residential Treatment Facilities in fiscal year 2007-2008. Susquehanna County accounted for sixteen (16) or 11.7% individuals (14 males; 2 females).

AGE AT TIME OF ADMISSION – TABLE III

The age of those served in Residential Treatment Facilities ranged from seven (7) years old to seventeen (17) years old at the time of admission. Nine (9) or 7.5% children were between the ages of 7 and 9; thirty-three (33) or 27.5% were between 10 and 12; fifty-four (54) or 45% were 13 – 15 years of age; and twenty-four (24) or 20% were 16 – 17 years old.

#### TYPE OF PLACEMENT- TABLE IV

There are three (3) primary referral sources that utilize Residential Treatment Facilities. The three (3) referral sources are as follows: Mental Health/Mental Retardation Programs, Children and Youth Services Programs, and Probation and Parole Programs. This table reflects the initial type of placement, although children/adolescents may have experienced a change in the type of placement throughout their stay. There were sixty-nine (69) or 57.5% placements made through mental health; forty-five (45) or 37.5% through children and youth; and six (6) or 5% through probation. One (1) or .8% of these children had a secondary diagnosis of mental retardation. This indicates a decrease from the previous fiscal year in which the percentage of children with a secondary diagnosis of mental retardation was 3.3%.

#### RANK ORDER OF ALL DIAGNOSES REPORTED – TABLE V

The most frequently reported diagnosis at the time of admission to a community psychiatric inpatient hospital was Bipolar Disorder, which was identified in 28 (23.3%) of the admissions. Another frequently cited diagnosis included Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder, which was identified in nineteen (19) 15.8% of the individuals. The third most frequently cited diagnosis was Mood Disorder, which was identified in fifteen (15) or 12.5% of the individuals. The table displays the diagnosis and frequency ranking for all of the children and adolescents who were admitted to a community inpatient hospital.

## RESIDENTIAL TREATMENT FACILITY – TABLE VI

Twenty-two (22) different Residential Treatment Facilities were utilized during the year. The table displays the Residential Treatment Facilities used throughout the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and elsewhere.

## NUMBER OF ADMISSIONS TO COMMUNITY PSYCHIATRIC INPATIENT HOSPITALS DURING STAY IN RESIDENTIAL TREATMENT FACILITY – TABLE VII

Tracking of admissions to community psychiatric inpatient hospitals of children and adolescents who are residing within Residential Treatment Facilities began in May, 2000. During fiscal year 2007-2008, there were eight (8) or 6.7% of the total one hundred twenty (120) children and adolescents within Residential Treatment Facilities that were also admitted to community psychiatric inpatient hospitals during their stay in the Residential Treatment Facility.

## DISCHARGES – TABLE VIII

Throughout fiscal year 2007-2008, there were fifty-one (51) or 42.5% of the child adolescent discharges using Residential Treatment Facilities, thirty-five (35) or 47.9% of the discharges were from BSU I, and sixteen (16) or 34% were from BSU II.

## TOTAL DAYS IN RESIDENTIAL TREATMENT FACILITIES DURING FISCAL YEAR TABLE IX

A total of 21,247 days of care were generated during fiscal year 2007-2008. Residents of BSU I accounted for 12,400 days or 58.4%, while children/adolescents from BSU II accounted for 8,847 days or 41.6%.

## TOTAL DAYS IN RESIDENTIAL TREATMENT FACILITIES SINCE ADMISSION – TABLE X

A total of 32,603 days of care were generated by the one hundred twenty (120) children and adolescents since their date of admission. Fifty-two (52) of the one

hundred twenty (120) children/adolescents had admission dates prior to the start of fiscal year 2007-2008.

BSU I accounted for 19,418 days or 59.6%, while BSU II accounted for 13,185 days or 40.4%.

#### BSU CONTACT- TABLE XI

During a child's or adolescent's stay in a Residential Treatment Facility, regular contact with his/her community treatment provider is maintained to ensure continuity of treatment. Table XI displays the frequency of contact with the individual's Base Service Unit. Although most (88.2%) of the contacts occurred on a monthly basis, 9.8% of them occurred weekly or bi-weekly.

#### FAMILY CONTACT – TABLE XII

The majority of families (92.1%) maintained contact with their family member who was in a Residential Treatment Facility. However, for four (7.8%) of the children or adolescents, there was no family contact during their stay.

#### DISCHARGE CUSTODY – TABLE XIII

Of the fifty-one (51) children and adolescents who were discharged in Fiscal Year 2007-2008, twenty-seven (27) were in the custody of their parents. Children and Youth Services maintained custody for another nineteen (19). Two (2) were identified as independent and another one was listed as "relative". Juvenile Probation accounted for the custody of another one (1). Another one (1) was listed as unknown.

#### DISCHARGE LIVING ARRANGEMENT – TABLE XIV

The majority of the children and adolescents (39.2%) who were discharged were planning to reside with their parents. The second most frequently cited arrangement was another residential treatment facility (21.6%). Another 2% would reside with

another relative. For 21.5% of those discharged, a placement in foster care (7.8%) or specialized foster care (13.7%) was arranged. Another 2% would move to a CRR group home. Also, 2% went to a juvenile justice placement. Another 3.9% went to a Drug and Alcohol Treatment Facility placement. One individual went to live in a shelter and another went into an independent living arrangement. One individual went to a hospital and another one went to a pre-adoptive home.

#### SERVICES USED (INCLUDES DISCHARGED ONLY) – TABLE XV

At least nineteen (19) different services could potentially be used by children and adolescents who are in need of treatment and/or supportive services. Table XV identifies the services that were being used at admission to a Residential Treatment Facility and discharge from a Residential Treatment Facility for the fifty-one (51) children and adolescents who were discharged during Fiscal Year 2007-2008. The most frequently used service at admission was medication management. The next most frequently used service was Children and Youth Services. The service that was ranked third highest in frequency at admission was Resource Coordination. At discharge, the same pattern of frequency of service use was indicated.

#### LENGTH OF STAY – (INCLUDES ALL DISCHARGED AND CONTINUED STAY) TABLE XVI

Length of stay in Residential Treatment Facilities ranged from less than three (3) months to more than eighteen (18) months. Twenty-two (22) or 18.3% of the individuals were in Residential Treatment Facilities for less than three (3) months; thirty-two (32) or 26.7% for 3 – 6 months; twenty (20) or 16.7% for 7 – 9 months; twenty-three (23) or 19.2% for 10 – 12 months; four (4) or 3.3% for 13 – 15 months; five (5) or 4.2% for 16 - 18 months; fourteen (14) or 11.7% for more than 18 months.

LENGTH OF STAY – (INCLUDES ONLY DISCHARGED CHILDREN)  
TABLE XVII through TABLE XIX

Fifty-one (51) of the one hundred twenty (120) children and adolescents were discharged during the 2007-2008 fiscal year. Therefore, the lengths of stay that are outlined in Table XVI are not included for the remaining children who are continuing their Residential Treatment Facility placement.

The lengths of stay for children and adolescents who have been discharged from a Residential Treatment Facility ranged from three to six months to more than eighteen (18) months. Five (5) or 9.8% were in a residential treatment facility for less than three months; fifteen (15) or 29.4% for 3 – 6 months; nine (9) or 17.6% for 7 – 9 months; ten (10) or 19.6% for 10 – 12 months; two (2) or 3.9 for 13 – 15 months; three (3) or 5.9% for 16 – 18 months; and seven (7) or 13.7% for greater than 18 months. The average length of stay for children who have been discharged is 230.4 days, or 7.7 months. This represents a significant decrease from the last two previous fiscal years in which the average length of stay was 8.4 months in fiscal year 2006-2007 and 12.1 months in fiscal year 2005-2006.
